ATL: Governance Structure

Board Overview

- ATL is governed by a 16-member board of appointed and elected representatives
- Five members appointed by state officials plus GDOT commissioner
- 10 members elected by local delegations to represent transit districts across a 13-county region
- Board is comprised of a mix of local business and community leaders and elected officials

Regional Transit Plan

- 6-year and 20-year time horizons
- Developed in consultation with the region's Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO): ARC
- Coordinate existing and future transit service
- After 1/1/2019, referendum transit projects must be in RTP & approved by the ATL

















Regional Transit Funding

- Up to 30 year,
 Up to 1%
 transit-specific
 SPLOST
- Projects must be in Regional Transit Plan & approved by the ATL
- Counties outside of 13-county region can pair together to use new T-SPLOST authority



Designated Recipient Role

- ATL's Scope:
 All Federal &
 State Transit
 Funds in region
- ATL can issue its own bonds and work with other state agencies to issue bonds















Regional Unified Branding

- Regional Transit Plan must include plan for the creation of a unified brand to encompass all transit service providers in 13-county region
- As of Jan. 1, 2019, any new MARTA asset worth more than \$250,000 must display The ATL logo and brand, prominently featuring the acronym "ATL"
- As of Jan. 1, 2023, the ATL logo and brand must be used on any and all MARTA property
- ATL awarded contract for branding and communications consulting services

MARTA retains control over its current local funding



- The ATL is administratively attached to GRTA
- GRTA and SRTA's roles in regional transit transitions to ATL by 2020/2021
- SRTA's tolling, GTIB, and transportation financing roles remain intact



 ARC & ATL work together to revise current regional transit process, and to ensure that Regional Transit Plan aligns and integrates with TIP and STP processes and funding

\$100M for SR 400 Transit Project

- SR 400 Express Lanes project will widen the highway, reduce congestion and accommodate the new Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) interchanges
- Gov. Nathan Deal announced \$100 million in General Obligation bonds for BRT infrastructure as part of the SR 400 Express Lanes project
- Made possible by the passage of HB 930
- Dedicated State Funding since GO!

Forecasting the Future: What's Next for the ATL

- First ATL Board Meeting December 14 (Swearing-In, Adoption of Bylaws and Agency Updates)
- Revise and strengthen regional transit planning process
- Discussion, development, and application of regional unified logo and branding
- Identify areas of commonalities for regional transit issues and lead the conversation on a consistent approach to solutions
- Identifying transit planning talent to staff the agency
- Serve as a source of information for the new administration related to transit, transit policy and transit funding
- Work with existing transit operators to identify early target areas for quick wins in taking a regional approach
