

Why Develop a
Transportation
Plan?

- Ensure that each County is able to meet the current and future mobility needs of residents and businesses.
- Ensure transportation priorities match community priorities.
- Develop a listing of prioritized transportation projects.
- Coordinate with other planning efforts.
- Early identification of funding issues and opportunities.

Goals and
Objectives

- Keep and improve the land use and transportation connection
 - Enhance countywide mobility through improved roadway connectivity
 - Protect our Downtown areas by removing trucks and other through traffic
 - Ensure that our transportation system is safe for all users and Citizens
 - Improve the range of mobility options for our Citizens
 - Protect our natural resources - parks, lakes, and historic sites
- *Consistent w/local comprehensive plans and local stakeholder input

Study
Update

- Documented comments from stakeholder and public meetings
- Evaluated existing and future conditions
- Developed preliminary improvement recommendations
- Developed prioritization strategy
- Began development of transportation plan documentation

Phase I:

- Public involvement (October 2007)
 - Public involvement process
 - Goals & objectives
- Data collection (June - December 2007)
 - Local comprehensive plans
 - Existing conditions inventory
 - Travel demand model
- Develop evaluation factors (December 2007)
- Existing & future operating conditions assessments (September 2007 - February 2008)

Phase II:

- Identification of potential improvements
– Underway

- Develop cost estimates
- Financial resources and funding
- Development of long-range transportation plan (horizon year of 2035)


- Identify Deficiencies and Develop Preliminary Improvements

- Review Proposed Improvements with Planning Partners
- Review Improvements with the Public
- Refine Improvements

Travel Demand
Model


- Developed a 3-County Travel Demand Model
 - Baseline conditions in 2006
 - Census Data
 - Traffic Counts
 - Employment Information - Dept. of Labor
 - School Enrollment
 - Socioeconomic forecasts - 2015 / 2035
 - County Allocation
- Identified potential improvements based on future transportation deficiencies
 - Mid-range - 2015
 - Long-range - 2035

Existing &
Future
Operating
Conditions

- Roadway operating conditions were evaluated using Level of Service (LOS)
- LOS compares volumes along the roadway to the capacity of that roadway
- LOS was derived using the Travel Demand Model
- Existing (2006) and Future (2015 & 2035) Operating Conditions were Evaluated




2006 Level of Service

- SR 16 from I-75 to Jackson - (Western City Limits)*
- South Jackson Bypass*
- SR 36 - Downtown Jackson One-Way Pair*
- SR 36 - Passing Lanes / Widening*
- SR 16 through Downtown Jackson
- SR 42 & US 23 - Widening South to Monroe County
- High Falls Road Widening
- Mt. Vernon Church Road Improvements

- Bridges
 - Over 20 foot span
 - Sufficiency rating 50 and below
- Intersections
 - Crash analysis
 - Public input

- Evaluation Factors
 - Public Involvement
 - Fill Gaps in Existing Network
 - Downtown / Activity Center Areas
 - One-Mile Buffer Around
 - Schools
 - Parks
 - Libraries
 - Public Facilities
 - McIntosh Trail RDC Bicycle & Pedestrian Plan

Bicycle &
Pedestrian
Potential
Improvements

- Pathway to Learning - Jackson High School
- Sidewalk improvements
- On-road bicycle routes
- Multi-use path at Ocmulgee River

- Needs

- Demand will Grow as Population Ages and County Continues to Grow
- Access to Job Centers in Atlanta and Macon

- Recommendations

- Park and Ride location in the Jackson area to accommodate carpooling, vanpooling, etc.
- Coordinate with McIntosh Trail RDC to publicize 5311 Rural Transit Program
- Coordinate with DHR Region Four to ensure that the needs of Butts County citizens are addressed

Rail
Evaluation

- Truck Routes
 - Improvements to SR 16, SR 36, SR 42, US 23
 - South Jackson Bypass
- Rail Lines
 - Safety
 - 9 crossing improvements proposed
 - Emergency access issues identified

Prioritization
Factors

- Identified Need
- Safety
- Connectivity
- Preserve / Enhance Downtowns
- Concept Design in Progress
- Supports Comprehensive Planning Efforts
- Maintains Transportation and Land Use Linkage
