HOW IS A FIRM CERTIFIED?

- An individual or firm interested in certification, must make application through the Georgia Unified Certification Program (GUCP).
- Pursuant to 49 CFR §26.81, all DOT recipients must participate in a Unified Certification Program (UCP).

WHAT IS THE GUCP?

- The Georgia Unified Certification Program (GUCP) is a statewide one stop shop certification for DBEs.
- Eligibility Criteria for DBE certification is outlined in 49 CFR Part 26. (49 CFR §26.61, Subpart D).
- By a preponderance of the evidence, the firm must prove that it meets the requirements of social and economic disadvantage, business size, personal net worth, ownership and control.



WHAT HAPPENS AFTER CERTIFICATION?

- Once certified, the firm's contact information, and NAICS code(s) are placed in the GUCP DBE directory,
- The directory is available to all contractors bidding on GDOT projects,
- The DBE firm has access to all programs and activities undertaken by the Supportive Services consultant.



WHAT HAPPENS AFTER CERTIFICATION Con't

- The Supportive Services agreement is designed to first identify any impediments to the success of DBE firms.
- Any impediments are methodically addressed through:
- a) DBE Roundtables,
- b) Matchmaker Sessions,
- c) Listening Sessions,
- d) Annual Conferences,
- e) One on One Assistance

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER CERTIFICATION Con't

Though the Certification process is complete once the DBE certification has been issued, in order to work with GDOT, the DBE will need to become prequalified as a Contractor or Consultant. That process is separate and distinct from the certification process and is designed to solicit the capabilities of the DBE in the work area it has identified.

CONCLUSION

The objective of the DBE program is to provide assistance to identified DBEs in the growth and development of their businesses.

We will achieve this end by creative and dedicated attention to the needs of our DBE firms.

We will continue working toward the creation of an increasingly credible and professional program that is seen as a benefit to the participating DBEs and the Prime Contractors with whom they are partnered.

EEO Accomplishments 2013

- On 01/01/2013, 219 DBE applications were pending review,
- All 219 of those applications were over the federally mandated 90 day review period,
- Average time elapsed on each application was 342 days,
- By mid January 2013, all 219 applications had been assigned for review and were finalized within 120 days,
- Between January and October 2013, 250 new applications have been received,
- All of the 250 new applications have been processed,
- All of the 250 new applications were processed within the federally mandated 90 day review period.



EEO Accomplishments 2013 cont

- Per federal mandate, EEO has created and implemented a Small Business Program,
- Partnered with OFCCP to conduct statewide contract compliance reviews (diminishing multiple reviews for contractors and offering more immediate compliance reporting for EEO),
- Restructured DBE unit. Hired a Lead Coordinator with new emphasis on ownership of applicant files to heighten efficiency and quality of review,
- Implemented a ready, willing and able DBE formula on project specific goals,
- Timely responses to all federal reporting directives,



EEO Accomplishments 2013 cont

- Development of training matrix to identify professional development needs of EEO staff,
- Formation of a Best Practices Committee to identify successful EEO activity in other DOT's for use at GDOT,
- Creation of specific outreach activity for pending GDOT projects providing greater notice and opportunity for DBE participation,
- Working with FHWA on the implementation of a business development program for DBEs,
